

Dictatorship/Pinochet 1973-1990

- September 11, 1973
- "Junta" overthrew government
- Forced "disappearances", torture and imprisonment
- Pinochet created economic inequality



Machuca

- Gonzalo Infante: High class, privileged, lives in Vitacura
- Pedro Machuca: Low class, lives in ghetto of San Miguel
- St. Patrick's: English language boys' only school





Machuca

- Went to two types of protests against Allende and against Pinochet
- Army official's view of Gonzalo
- Machuca's drunk father made a classist point of the social differences between Gonzalo and Machuca



Socioeconomic Inequality


- Gini Index- 52.1
